MENTAL HEALTH ACCESS - HELD SPACE

As important as we believe it is to engage in honest, direct discussions about mental health and/or addictions, this material can be difficult or triggering for some. In line with a commitment to being trauma-informed, each program venue will have an onsite *Held Space* and active listener. The *Held Spaces* are quiet areas where anyone can go to during and after programs to take care of themselves. These spaces will contain a sensory lounge with art making supplies, mental health resources and an active listener, to help guests regulate and ground, should you need to talk. Guests are welcome to come and go as they need while engaging with the festival.

PHYSICAL ACCESS

Unfortunately, not all of our program spaces are wheelchair accessible (entrance and washrooms). Please see the map which indicates which spaces are accessible.

NAVIGATION ASSISTANCE

Since navigating to new venues can be challenging, please see our website for venue accessibility information, including navigation guides (written and/or video). These guides will tell you how to find a venue and what to expect from the space when you arrive.

FINANCIAL ACCESS

There are Pay What You Wish (PWYW) tickets available at all Rendezvous With Madness programs and performances. Please ask the box office.

PERSONAL SUPPORT WORKERS

If you require a personal support worker to accompany you to programs, please let our box office know and we would be happy to welcome your personal support worker free of charge to any programs.

We will provide ASL interpretation at select programs. Our ASL services will be provided by a collaborative team including a deaf interpreter and a hearing interpreter. In mental health settings, ASL interpreters primarily work alongside Deaf interpreters who are Signed Language experts. We often don't know a Deaf person's cognitive ability, linguistic background, or upper extremity mobility issues. Having a Deaf interpreter helps us be able to connect with more of the Deaf and hard of hearing community. If you require ASL interpretation in order to engage with a program you're interested in, please indicate that need when purchasing tickets, as we also try to book ASL interpreters based on expressed needs.

OPEN CAPTIONING

We will provide open captioning for all film programs. At select live performance events, ASL interpretation will be supplemented by live captioning. Check the calendar to see which programs will be ASL interpreted. If you require open or live captioning in order to engage with a program you're interested in, please indicate that need when purchasing tickets, as we also try to arrange for captioning based on expressed needs.

SERVICE ANIMALS

MAKING MAD: HOW EXPRESSIONS OF VULNERABILITY CONNECT US

Through humour and pathos, the artists in *Making Mad* explore the ways in which depictions of vulnerability in their work resonate on a human scale. Deep-diving into personal touchstones that go beyond the individual, these works relate in poignant and absurd ways to our condition as a collective of fallible, temporal beings.

Vulnerability is rarely associated with courage, yet it is central to survival. Happiness and contentment require little consideration — fitting well within our expectations and ideals — yet pain and uncertainty seem to demand justification in order to understand their purpose and meaning, especially in the absence of any explanation.

The artists in *Making Mad* unapologetically take cues from their own misgivings to draw attention to our universal susceptibility to harm. They attempt to debunk stigma equated with weakness, shame and isolation, to embrace the compassion, intimacy and intensity of the ways in which vulnerability teaches us to live with an awareness of the likelihood of change.

Devastation Portraits is a series of performative images, staged by the artist, who deliberately collapses face down in public spaces. These overt re-enactments give visibility to the often invisible weight of anxiety and depression and challenge societal norms of what is considered "appropriate" emotional expression. Alison continues to produce these scenarios for sharing on social media, and they have been featured in BuzzFeed, Metro.uk and on the NPR Picture Show.

Alison Crouse is a Philadelphia-based artist, filmmaker, photographer and instructor. She received her MFA in Film and Media Arts from Temple University and her BFA in Photography from the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design and University of Vermont. Her award-winning film and videos have been broadcast, screened and distributed internationally. Alison Crouse's photographic work has been published and shown in galleries across North America.

PETER DILLMAN

45 Homes is a body of work which chronicles the forty-five different homes that artist Peter Dillman moved in and out of throughout his life with a changing constellation of family members, housemates and partners. Through the compilation of documentary materials, such as census data and photographs, the artist reconstructs and recounts a history of domestic instability from an early age, moving to a more stable environment as he achieved autonomy.

Peter Dillman is a Toronto-based multi-disciplinary artist, curator, theatre professional and instructor. He studied Fine Art at the University of Waterloo, Theatre Design at the National Theatre School, and Culture and Heritage Management at Centennial College. His multi-media work explores themes of home and environment. Peter Dillman's work has been exhibited across Canada and is held in corporate and private collections.

ESMOND LEE

Ancestral Veneration is a photo-based series depicting the inter-generational realities of migration. As a second-generation Chinese Canadian, Lee's work examines the nuances and ambiguities of suburban cultural evolutions. His layering of familial and familiar motifs on vinyl mesh banner material echo the clash and assimilation of ancestral values with contemporary identities and experiences.

Esmond Lee is a Toronto-based artist and architect. He holds a Master of Architecture (University of Toronto) and Bachelor of Architectural Studies (Carleton University). He has received Toronto and Ontario Art Council grants and is recognized by the Ontario Association of Architects. His work has been exhibited at Gallery 44, Koffler Centre for the Arts, Toronto Media Arts Centre and Artscape Youngplace. 

Margot's character offers audiences an intimate examination of the deep-rooted psychological causes of addiction. *Our Wonderful Lives* gives us a nuanced and refreshing look into community-based recovery and the significance of something as simple as friendship.

IN SEARCH...

Director Beryl Magoko underwent Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) as a child. Unlike many of her peers, she wasn't forced into it. Feeling pressured by societal expectations, Beryl went through FGM behind her mother's back. Nobody told her about the pain, guilt and trauma that would follow her into adulthood. Years later, Beryl learns that her FGM can be reversed with the help of reconstructive surgery. But after everything she has been through, she's hesitant to make a decision. "Will I be making another terrible mistake?" In her documentary, Beryl is searching for an answer. She asks other women who survived FGM about their experiences and thoughts on reconstructive surgery. By frontlining these stories, Beryl processes her trauma and exposes the extreme misogynist ideologies behind FGM.

Created over the course of five years, *Bedlam* takes us inside Los Angeles County's overwhelmed and vastly under-resourced psychiatric ER; a nearby jail warehousing thousands of patients; and people suffering from severe mental health issues in their homes and homeless encampments, where silence and shame often worsen the suffering.

Menahem Lang is an Israeli actor with a tragic past. He was raped as a child by several older men from his own community. Lang grew up in the Haredi sect, an ultra-Orthodox Jewish community known for its theological conservatism. After confronting one of his abusers, Lang left his hometown of Bnei Brak and hasn't been back. In *M*, Lang returns to face his community, his trauma and to seek justice. But more than anything, Lang ends up finding other survivors. Shooting her film entirely at night, director Yolande Zauberman follows Lang as he runs into multiple strangers on the streets of his old neighborhood where they all confess the same thing — they were also sexually abused as children by older men in the community. Through many candid interviews, we learn that child molestation is rampant in their community, turning the abused into abusers in a vicious circle of sexual violence.

JUNHA'S PLANET

Junha is a 4th grader who doesn't make friends easily. Afraid he will attack or spit on them, his classmates keep their distance. Junha's teachers spend most of their time with Junha trying to discipline him or simply understand why he behaves the way he does. But Junha lives on the Autism spectrum: he has little to no control over his impulses. Concerned parents of Junha's peers question whether he should be educated in the same environment as their kids. While the school advocates for Autism awareness and encourages children to support Junha, many lose their patience. Including Junha. *Junha's Planet* is a quiet and powerful observational documentary that addresses some of the most pressing issues at the intersection of disability and education.

KABUL, CITY IN THE WIND

In this subtle and beautiful documentary portrait, first time feature film director Aboozar Amini captures the everyday lives of 12-year old Afshin and his younger brother Benjamin alongside bus driver Abas. The three subjects of this subtle portrait of Kabul take us on a journey of their daily lives where war is omnipresent. Amini's gentle camerawork gives us time to witness the intricacies of life in Kabul, where dust appears as a main character in the film. *Kabul, City in the Wind* unfolds via intimate direct interviews with the subjects and observations of daily routines: in between the markets and helicopters buzzing, Abas' bus keeps breaking down and Afshin becomes head of the household when their father, a former soldier, unexpectedly has to go to Iran. Kabul, a city that is mostly known for war and death, is presented lovingly as home for those who strive for a better tomorrow.



RETROSPEKT (RETROSPECT)

Retrospect is a chaotic puzzle of an unreliable narrator's memories, anarchic bursts of punk music, a sporadic and shredded timeline. And yet, in the heart of the story are Mette and her so-called 'perfect' nuclear family. Mette (Circé Lethem) is a domestic violence support worker, and the film starts with her intervening in a violent and abusive altercation involving a strange young couple on vacation. It then jumps to a family dinner where Mette confronts her husband, who clearly doesn't equate the importance of her career to his. After this uncomfortable scene, back to the future and Mette in the hospital following a catastrophic accident. She's now in a wheelchair and has no recollection of preceding events. Gradually, Mette starts remembering how she invited Lee (Lien Wildemeersch), a client, to escape an abusive partner by moving in. The arrangement soon explodes, Mette's flashbacks offering only vague clues to the calamity. But who is really to blame for Mette's downfall?
